The New Day the Lord has Made Pastor David Deal

"This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it."

We hear and repeat these words often at Sunday and other worship services. Of course, God has made every day. But **Sunday** - Sunday is the special day that God has made. And **Easter Sunday** - **EASTER DAY** - is the great day of days God has made. Our words are louder and fuller with faith and joy. For on the day of Resurrection = Easter Day - God raised from the dead the one who was put to death by execution, "by hang-ing him on a tree." Jesus, the Son of God, died for each and every one of us and for every single human being. In fact, Jesus died and was raised for the whole creation.

This day, this Sunday, this Easter Day begins a new life, a new creation. Sin and evil, violence and war, guilt and shame, and death have been overshadowe4d by the Resurrection of God's Son - for us!

Evangelism: Those who attended Pastor Moss session on People Spots will be meeting to review his suggestions and to evaluate our progress in instituting them. The cluster is investigating a follow up with additional ideas and help; but first we need a self evaluation and maybe some goal setting.

Because they buy in quantity, Church World Service can purchase a blanket for \$5.00; but any donation is appreciated.

Barbara Naska is leading our April program dealing with **Foods in the Bible**; she and Helen Dungan will be offering some samples as refreshments. *Be brave and join us*!

Upper Bucks Women of the ELCA will meet on Saturday April 24th at Christ Lutheran Church Trumbauersville. Registration begins at 8:30, breakfast will begin at 9:00. Our program is a hymn sing so if you enjoy singing, please join us for a fun morning. We are collecting materials for health kits as part of the program (the recent disasters have really depleted supplies). An offering will be taken which will be split between the Quakertown food pantry and WELCA.

Health kits include:

- One hand towel measuring approximately 16" x 28" (no fingertip or bath towels),
- One washcloth,
- One wide-tooth comb,
- One nail clipper (not emery board),
- One bar of soap (bath size in wrapper),
- One toothbrush (in original packaging),
- Six standard size Band-Aids®

Bear Creek Day Camp is coming June 28-July 2. The camp is for students who have completed Kindergarten through fifth grade. We discussed logistics including housing for the counselors, costs, advertising, and subsidizing families with more than one camper.

Parish Nurse – implementation work continues; a presentation is being developed which will be presented to each congregation hopefully this summer; and grant opportunities are being investigated. The goal is to be up and running by January 1, 2011.

Evangelism: The bulk of the meeting was a lively discussion of our outreach to unchurched members of our communities. There was consensus that we are not doing a good job; a sense that Lutherans are not good at sharing their faith or inviting their friends or neighbors to join them at church; that training in witnessing is needed. There was also concern that to do this we need to be open to change; and that is a problem for many (if not all) of us.

We are going to continue this discussion and look into more training and help. We also want to look at part two of our evangelism goal – to energize our individual faith lives. We will continue the discussion at our next meeting to be held on 6:30 May 16th at Christ Springtown.

First Holy Communion is the moment when a promise and gift granted at Baptism is re-given in a new way. The essence of first communion is to participate in the sharing of the bread (the Body of Christ) and the cup (the Blood of Christ) at Christ's table of grace.
