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RETURN TO THE LORD Pastor David Deal

"... return to the Lord, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love ..." (Joel 2:13, from the first reading for Ash Wednesday)

Return to the Lord? What does that mean? Does it mean that God has been absent from our lives? Or that we have taken a temporary leave of absence from a relationship with God?

NO! God has never left or deserted us. God has promised to be with us from the time of our baptism. God's grace is always available to us. Perhaps, what "return to the Lord" means is that we have rejected or failed to access God's amazing grace in our lives. We have attempted to keep our minds, our hearts, our choices,, our priorities separated from God. This has led to sin, brokenness, and happiness. But God has never left us.

During these 40 days of Lent, we have the opportunity to return to our baptismal promises and to recall the wonderful relationship God has established with us. God wants us to re-open our minds and hearts to God's will for us. Let me suggest that we begin to "return to the Lord" by regular worship, a daily life of prayer, Bible reading, and unselfish acts of service for those around us. In this way, we will all experience God's grace in deeper and more powerful ways.

Council Corner

After the second week in March, I will no longer be your congregational leader. According to our by-laws if you have served on council for six consecutive years you must come off of council. Since the president must be a member of council, this is the reason for my departure of this position. Even though I will no longer be your president, that does not mean that I will not continue to do my part to keep our church growing and doing God's work.

Over the last three years we have been through a lot together and I feel that we have worked well as a team to accomplish situations that at times seemed impossible to rectify. Remember the tax situation, the steeple problem, the need for a new roof and now the windows? On top of these big matters we had several insurance issues, septic problems, heater problems and other repairs and maintenance jobs to deal with. Our property committee and others in and outside the congregation have worked overtime to bring our church back to the beautiful building that has sat on top of this hill in Durham for almost 200 years lighting the way to God's love. But, we must always remember that the "church" is not the building. The "church" is the body of people sitting in the pews. We must go out into the world everyday and do God's work and spread the news that God loves all mankind. He also gives people who have made mistakes a second chance and His love is unconditional! That is real good news to anyone who feels unworthy or guilty for the way that they have behaved in their life. This is the job that God gives to us as Christians to do.

This message is carried forward not just in words, but more so in actions towards people who are down-trodden and feeling hopeless. God is love, and the love he gives to us is to be shared, to help others who do not feel love in their everyday lives.

I believe that God's first commandment is the most important one to remember. "Thou shall love the Lord your God with all of your heart and soul and love your neighbors as yourself". This, in my opinion, means that we have to love ourselves before we can reach out to our neighbors, both near and far. For these past several years we have been putting our own house "back in order". Unfortunately, it had deteriorated because of lack of enough people committed to help maintain it. The Sunday school had dwindled down to almost nothing because of lack of involvement from many young families. So many outside commitments came before God. Even our finances have been reduced due to the economy and lack of attendance to Sunday services. As our older members passed on new people have not joined us to fill the gap. Do not be discouraged because I feel that many of theses problems are turning around and many of our prayers have been answered.

Our building, which is a symbol of God's love and presence here in Durham, is almost back to the beautiful façade it used to be, and is more inviting to the public. Thanks to all of you who helped with your good works and contributions to make this all possible. We still have more work to do, for instance, the blacktop needs to be repaired for insurance issues, but the building itself is now safe and sound.

Our biggest mission now is to reach out to family, friends and neighbors and invite them to join us. Perhaps you can invite them to one of our soup suppers, or an event such as our annual beef roast or upcoming Easter service. Any of these types of events can break the ice and let them know that we are good people and fun to be with. In this way they may want to join us for Sunday services and become a part of our caring "family".

CHICAGO (ELCA) - The Rev. Douglas A. Hill, a pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), was walking in the town of Jacmel, Haiti, when the earthquake struck the Caribbean nation Jan. 12. Only 10 kilometers from the quake's epicenter, Hill suddenly found himself surrounded by death and ruin.

"We heard a big rumble and people screaming. The rumble felt like it lasted forever, but it was only 45 seconds," Hill told the ELCA News Service. Hill and his companions began searching for people. "All of our people were fine."

Hill was in Haiti leading a group of 11 seminary students on a January term theology course coordinated by Abiding Hope Lutheran Church, Littleton, Colo. Hill is a pastor of the congregation. Abiding Hope provides immersion experiences in Haiti for intern and seminary students attending the eight seminaries of the ELCA.

The group arrived Jan. 11 in Port-au-Prince. They spent their first evening at Wings of Hope, an orphanage for special needs children. The next day they traveled to Jacmel, where the group spent the day visiting the Trinity House, an orphanage for boys and school for the poor in Jacmel, and Pazapa, another school.

After the visits, "we went back to our hotel in Jacmel and sat at the bar with our Haitian friends, talking politics. Then some of us went for a walk in the streets a block from the Bay of Jacmel, looking at Haitian art in the many shops and galleries, when the earthquake hit," said Hill.

"We ran up the hill to the square after the earthquake, because water from the bay started coming up the street. (At) the square, the majority of our group watched people die," Hill said.

"People who were wounded were being carried on doors. Our students watched people die right in front of them. It was terrible, absolutely horrible," he said.

"I had gone back to the hotel at that time, retrieving the rest of the group and digging out Alexandra, the hotel cook. Our hotel was La Florita, and it had collapsed," said Hill.

The group returned to the Trinity House for shelter. "When we got there the boys were outside singing, 'How Great Thou Art' in Creole. We joined them, singing in English," Hill said. "We stayed there a short while when some one brought word that there was a risk of a tsunami, so we went to the Jacmel airport. There we became refugees with the Haitian people and lived on peanut butter, bread and then bananas."

"The Haitians took care of us," said Hill. "They are beautiful people. They welcomed us as brothers and sisters. In the refugee area, we slept and lived with the Haitian people for two days. We didn't provide care for anyone; they provided care for us there," he said.

Two days later United Nations officials moved Hill and his group to a hotel in Jacmel. "We ran out of food and water there. We had Haitian friends that brought us food, and we shared what we had with hotel staff," said Hill.

"On Saturday morning (Jan. 16), our Haitian friends got us two fishing boats. We rode these to the border of Haiti and the Dominican Republic. At one point on the boat trip we ran out of gas, marooned for about an hour and a half before help came," Hill said.

Once ashore the group spent the night at the border. In the morning they walked across the border and took a five-hour bus ride, passing through various military check points.

"The border was heavily guarded, since the Dominican Republic feared that Haitians would storm (across) the border," said Hill. Once they arrived in Santo Domingo, they made flight arrangements to return home. "Some of our group flew out on Monday, and the rest went home on Tuesday," he said.

"Our ordeal was one thing, but I don't want to draw attention to us," Hill told the ELCA News Service. "The focal point here is the hope, peace, faith and the pursuit of life around us that overshadowed the death and destruction we saw."

"We encountered friendliness and kindness from everyone we met. Haitians are strong people, full of hope," said Hill. "I am incredibly humbled by the depth and strength of the people in Haiti."

Hill said he hopes the seminary students on the trip will view their experiences as the "Kingdom of God being revealed. You can't teach the kingdom, it has to be revealed."

"We went to Haiti to walk with our Haitian brothers and sisters, and we are changed from the experience. In Haiti you see God being present with people," said Hill. "I look at my experience through the lens of (Christ's) Resurrection. The Haitians are not dwelling on the devastation. They're dwelling on the new life that will come out of this," he said.
